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ST. PAUL'S REMEMBERS

On Friday, the school community observed Remembrance Day in a deeply moving way. Our children, from reception to year six, handcrafted poppies to pay their respects and honour the memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice during times of war. The 110 poppies we created held a special significance for us. They were a heartfelt tribute to the 110 local men from Swanley who lost their lives in World War I, their names forever etched on the Swanley War Memorial. Our children, standing in solemn unity behind their handcrafted poppies, symbolized our commitment to remembrance and respect. Our short ceremony was a powerful reminder of the enduring significance of Remembrance Day, connecting past, present, and future generations. It was also a moment to pause and reflect as a community. The children observed the traditional two-minute silence and listened to the 'Last Post'. We also listened to a series of prayers and poems, read out by some of the children from Maple Class.
